If yes or no, please give an explanation as to your decision.

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One of your patients is prescribed **Meropenem** and they have a **Penicillin** allergy. What should you do?

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You are caring for a patient who has come back from theatre at 16:00 following a DHS. You are administering medications at 18:00 and your patient is due 4,500 units of **Tinzaparin**. Before administering the medication, what two things should you check?

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You are working on nights and you are performing the controlled drug checks. When checking **Oxycodone** you find that there should be 28 tablets. However, you can only find 14, therefore there is a strip missing. What actions should you take?

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You are caring for a patient with type 1 diabetes and they are prescribed 10 units of **Insulatard** in the morning. You take their blood sugar before breakfast and it is 3.8. The patient states they do not feel like any breakfast this morning and may have something to eat later. Do you administer or omit the insulin?

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
